Emotional & Mental Wellness Ministry

A FLICK OF LIGHT



The St. Raymond Emotional and Mental Wellness Ministry has learned from our parish mental health survey that anxiety is the #1 issue in our community. Here is an insightful article on the topic from Susan Haarman, a therapist with a Masters in Divinity.

From the words of St. Paul: "Brothers and sisters: Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice! Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near. Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

For anyone who's experienced anxiety, the admonition to just "not worry" or "stop being anxious" is usually ineffective and often feels like a dismissal. Anxiety spirals are overwhelming and attempts to reason our way out of them are typically ineffective in the face of powerful physical and emotional responses. In the wake of COVID, anxiety became an intimately familiar feeling as a result of the pandemic and its ongoing effects. I never thought that having a panic attack just going to a crowded grocery store would become a common shared experience, but here we are. And while the holidays are festive for many of us, for others this is a time of struggle and painful reminders of loss and broken relationships.

So, in the midst of our shared struggles, I encourage us not to focus on denying anxiety, pain, or fear, but rather to be joyful. Joy is the proclamation of knowing and feeling that we are loved by God. It can exist in times of pain AND happiness. Pope Francis reminds us that "Joy adapts and changes, but it always endures, even as a flicker of light born of our personal certainty that, when everything is said and done, we are infinitely loved." Joy is not predicated on perfection, serenity, or having it all together. It begins and ends in the reality of a loving and faithful God who cares for us.

God Moment

One Saturday afternoon while running errands, I stopped in a drive-thru to pick up a to-go burger to keep my day going when I noticed this big noisy truck backing up the wrong way in the drive-thru after getting his meal. His impatience and recklessness really annoyed me. As I watched him in my rear-view mirror, I noticed something extraordinary. He had purchased another value meal and was giving it to a homeless gentleman who was sitting next to his shopping cart at the far end of the parking lot. Mixed emotions went through my mind. After picking up my lunch and driving two blocks down El Camino I saw that same big noisy truck parked in an illegal manner, with him out of his truck giving another displaced individual a value meal.

Matthew 25:40 ("Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me") has always been an important passage for me, and I have acted on it in my own way, but this one caught me off guard and inspired me to another personal level. Right after seeing that, I drove to Costco where I picked up bulk hygiene supplies, socks, vitamins and whatever else I could find that would fit into individual lunch bags that might help the marginalized individuals in our community. I went home, filled up two dozen bags, and put them in my car. Now when I am driving around town and see an individual in need, I stop and offer them a care bag that might provide them a little comfort.

If I ever see that mystery guy in the big noisy truck again, I would love to buy HIM a value meal and thank him for what he did for me that day. Though I am sure the Almighty Lord doesn't actually eat fast food. God is good.

Parish children and parents helped serve the hungry and pour hot beverages into eager hands.

The Advent Fair drew crowds of people to holiday decorated tables advertising the vibrant ministries of our parish community. The new Emotional and Mental Wellness ministers greeted parishioners for the first time. Across the way, Carmen and Candace from our Art and Environment team supervised tables for making your own Advent wreath.

Fr. Jerome happened by just then beaming with joy. I think we all felt that beam of light - and

WE ARE FAMILY, WITH ONE COMMON HOME


At every meeting of *Laudato Si'* we share a "God Moment" from the previous week. Sometimes those moments are glimpses of joy and gratitude for the beautiful world God has created for us. Others seem to be times of desolation, of problems, anxieties, worries. Sometimes sharing those worries triggers another God Moment of caring and understanding, as we bring all our experiences into God's loving Grace. On this last Sunday of 2021, we'd like to begin sharing some of the actions of Laudato Si' over the last year and a half and the God moments we've experienced through those actions.

When Amy and Colleen first gathered us together in May 2020 (via Zoom, of course), simply as a reading group to read Pope Francis' encyclical Laudato Si', I (Mary McCarty) jumped in as an opportunity for intellectual stimulation and a bit of social interaction in our isolation. For me, it could have been any book, and indeed I joined several online reading communities for stimulation and interaction. (We also later read together Rachel Carson's Silent Spring and Braiding Sweetgrass by Robin Wall Kimmerer.) I am sure none of us anticipated what this group would become. Through close reading (a sort of Lectio Divina) of one chapter a week, and sharing the parts that affected us the most, we clarified our own thoughts and reactions to the Pope's words. We all learned more about the facts of the climate crisis, and were stimulated to educate ourselves more from other books, articles, and news stories that we shared. As we heard from the other members, we heard the diversity of concerns and priorities and responses among us. I expect that diversity will be revealed in upcoming stories from other members.

One thing that surprised and impressed all of us was to learn the history of environmental care in the social teachings of the Catholic Church as Pope Francis reports in the introduction. Personally, I discovered, and now cherish, the deep roots of care for creation in our Scriptures and teachings. This is not merely a social, economic, scientific, or political movement; it doesn't matter which political party you favor, or even what country you call your home. The climate crisis we face, and are already experiencing, with its garbage and chemical pollution, drought, fires, intensified storms, sea-level rise, and accompanying eco-

migration, is a global phenomenon. It reminds us that all human beings are members of one global family that embraces not only human beings but all parts of God's creation here on earth: animals, plants, and natural resources. And we all must take responsibility for all of it.

That is the concept I most wanted to share with you on this last Sunday of the year, the feast of the Holy Family, which reminds us of the love and power of relationships. As the mother of two recently married sons, I know both the challenges and rewards that extended family brings. We are all enriched when our loving arms and minds open up to more people, and beyond that, even to the animals, plants, and resources of our planet. The St. Raymond Laudato Si' group has truly become an extended family for me, and I invite you, my fellow members of St. Raymond parish, to join our family in our efforts to love, protect, and fight for our Common Home.
